Talmud, Midrash, and Prayer: The Tripod of Rabbinic Judaism

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In the wake of the destruction of the Second Temple two millennia ago, a group of people we now call "the Rabbis" compiled the Talmud to structure our lives with law, the Midrash to enhance our lives with fantasy, and Prayer to surround our lives with God. We'll study this tripod of Judaism that has become our heritage, learning what it contains and how its various parts continue to impact our lives today.

Over the course of our ten weeks together, we will explore typical passages from the Talmud, from the Midrash, and from the prayerbook. We will focus on three aspects of these Jewish sources: (1) their basic nature and what we learn from them; (2) how they form part of the rabbinic mindset; and (3) how they continue to impact us today.

By the end of the ten weeks, you will understand these three central kinds of Jewish sources as well as how they contribute to Judaism today. You will also have a deeper understanding of the texts that we study.
