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.....Overview

When Napoleon helped usher in the Englightenment in the 19th century, he set the stage for the emancipation of Europe's Jews. Over the course of a century, the Jews of Western Europe, under the lasting influence of Napolean, would become a religion instead of a people, and would see widespread acceptance in society. The Jews of Eastern Europe would remain a people and would remain more opressed by their rulers.

As the Enlightenment spread, Jews and non-Jews alike looked forward to a time without the ancient curse of war.

The 20th-century promise of world-wide peace and better times was quickly broken first by World War I, then by the Holocaust. As the world fell apart as was put back together, the Modern State of Israel was formed and the value of the New World was made clear.

Against this traumatic backdrop, thriving Jewish communities flourished first in the New World, then in Israel, and finally again in Europe.
